<b>Learning Outcomes</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- They can understand and use very simple words that aim to meet the concrete requirements with ordinary and everyday words.</li><li>- If the person speaking with him / her is speaking slowly and in a way that is helpful to him, he can communicate in a simple way.</li><li>- They can introduce themselves or someone else and give information about where they live, what they have, etc. and they can ask and answer questions about themselves/other people.</li><li>- Students will be able to understand frequently used idioms related to single sentences and direct priority areas (such as simple and personal and family information, shopping, close environment, work).</li></ul>
